#### Help Me Grow Core Components

#### **Core Components**

Child health care provider outreach to support early detection and intervention.

#### 2

Community outreach to promote use of Help Me Grow and to provide networking opportunities among families and service providers.

#### 3

Centralized telephone access point for connecting children and their families to services and care coordination.

#### 4

Data collection to understand all aspects of the Help Me Grow system, including the identification of gaps and barriers.

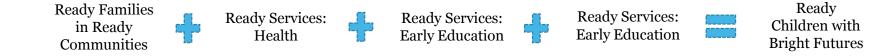

# **Key Funding Milestones**

- 2011: HMG National Network 2 year planning grant
- 2012: Community Foundation of Greater Birmingham
  3 year grant
- 2014: Alabama Department of Mental Health through a Project LAUNCH Grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Association
- 2015: Alabama Department of Early Childhood Education through the Preschool Development Grant

#### 2005-2010: Early Detection Becomes a Priority

- Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems Blueprint for Zero to Five includes priority of regular developmental screening and referral as one of the major indicators to track
- 30% of parents in Alabama have concerns about their young child's health and development



#### 2005-2010: Early Detection Becomes a Priority

- AABCD grant targets policy barriers and physician outreach for screenings and referrals
- Success in policy change to cover screenings at wellchild visits through Medicaid and private insurance

### • Results:

- Physician screening with ASQ increased from 4% to 78%; rate of referrals went from 5% to 11%
- ALL Kids saw a 600% increase in children that were given recommended screenings
- Referrals to services for developmental concerns more than doubled in one year

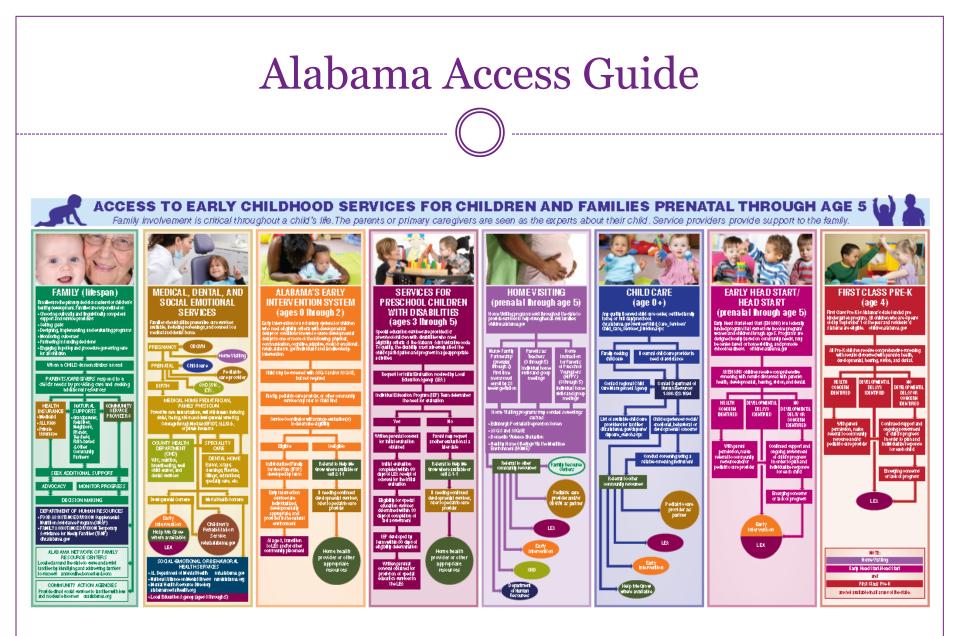
#### 2005-2010: Early Detection Becomes a Priority

- Alabama partners applied for a planning grant from Help Me Grow National (awarded January 2011)
- Early Intervention adopted ASQ-3 and trained staff across the state
- APC developed and provided training on ASQ-3 in (5) areas of the state for early childhood, home visiting, and family support staff
- Began outreach to the pediatric community in a few areas of the state

- Developed materials and protocols for Help Me Grow Central Alabama, began outreach and care coordination in partnership with 2-1-1 and United Way of Central Alabama
- Received grant from Community Foundation of Greater Birmingham to fully develop physician outreach for HMG Central Alabama through Reach Out and Read/AAP/Success By 6/United Way
- 65 out of 67 county health departments adopt the ASQ-3 as their assessment tool

- Books, Balls, and Blocks (BBB) activities held across the state, hundreds of children screened with referral rates for concerns from 6-12% of those screened
- Engaged the 2-1-1 Connects Alabama network and the Parenting Assistance Line to determine the best way to streamline calls for Help Me Grow
- State First Class Pre-K adopts the ASQ-3 and uses in all programs

- Added (5) additional pediatric practices in the HMG Central Alabama region
- Developed a comprehensive access chart with referral resources, process, contact information for children birth through school age
- Provided professional development and training on the Alabama Access Guide to Early Childhood Resources and related protocols



## Alabama Access Guide

### Designed for service providers

- To navigate the system of available resources and provide guidance for appropriate referrals
- To streamline the connection of children and families to the supports they need
- To prevent children and families from "falling through the cracks" of an often overwhelming system

## Books, Balls, and Blocks

- Free and fun HMG event for children and families to screen children for developmental delays in the first five years of life
- Children engage in games and activities at different stations
- Parents learn how these interactions help stimulate their child's development while screening their child using the ASQ-3



- Partners submit and are granted Project LAUNCH grant to support expansion of HMG
- Strategic planning done by the leadership team to refine the plan for statewide expansion
- Purchased and adapted comprehensive database for HMG Alabama

# Alabama Project LAUNCH

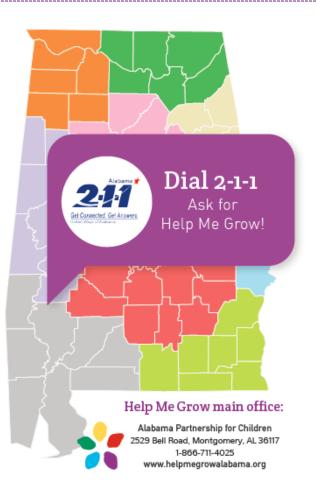
- State and local Young Child Wellness Councils
- Five prevention and promotion strategies:
  - Screening and assessment in a range of child-serving settings
  - $\circ$  Integration of behavioral health into primary care
  - $\circ\,$  Mental health consultation in early care and education
  - Enhanced home visiting with a focus on social and emotional well-being
  - Family strengthening and parent skills training



- **January**: Project LAUNCH supports capacity for new HMG West Alabama region and statewide coordination; West Alabama care coordinator and state director are hired
- **February**: First HMG leadership team meeting and a care coordination workgroup is started to adapt all HMG Utah materials for Alabama
- **March**: UWCA hosts HMG Utah for a live database training for all HMG and Project LAUNCH staff
- April: HMG Central Alabama hires new regional care coordinator
- **May**: HMG Alabama team begins utilizing the new Family Database
- **November**: The APC receives funding from the Alabama Department of Early Childhood Education to expand services statewide into all 2-1-1 Connects Alabama regions
- **December**: 2-1-1 call centers begin hiring and designating regional care coordinators, and training begins on database and developmental screening

# Help Me Grow Alabama Expands Statewide! November 2015: 2 regions, 2 care coordinators, 14 counties January 2016:

9 regions, 9 care coordinators, 67 counties

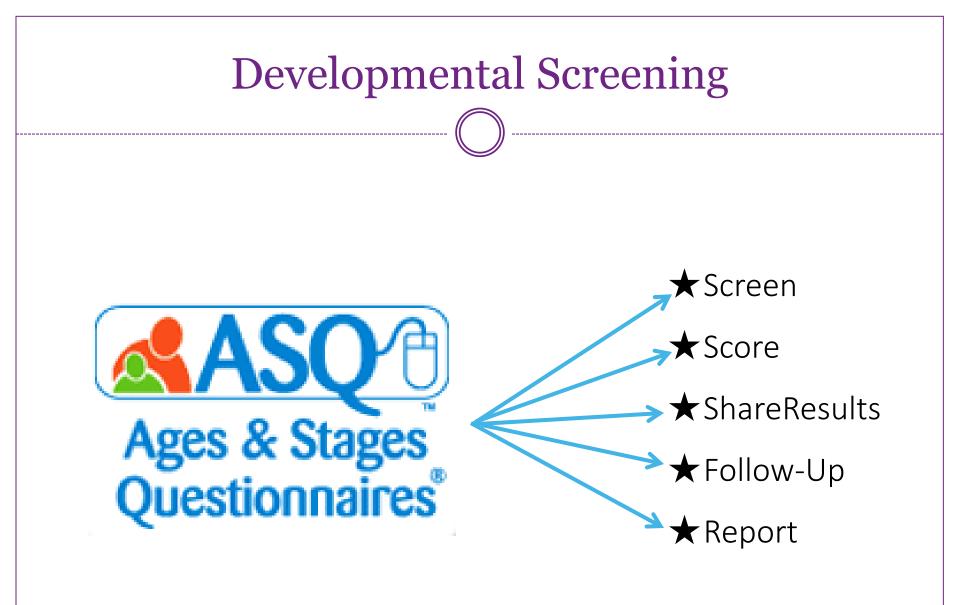






## **Developmental Screening**

## **ASQ Enterprise**

### ASQ Enterprise allows program to:

- Create and manage child and program records
- $\circ\,$  Store results and follow-up decisions in child records
- Easily track when children need to be screened
- Access activities parents can try at home to encourage child progress
- Access automatic scoring and screening selection to help eliminate scoring errors and provide more accurate referral information
- Analyze both child and program level data and track trends across time

### Partnerships: 2-1-1 Connects Alabama

- Dial 2-1-1 and ask for Help Me Grow!
  - Centralized telephone access point
  - $\circ$  9 regions serving 67 counties
  - Extensive database for **local** resources to meet the needs of families
  - Existing community connections and **local** partnerships

- Access to pediatricians with a unified message about early childhood development
- Streamlined partnership simplifies what we are both asking of health care providers--to prepare America's youngest children to succeed in school



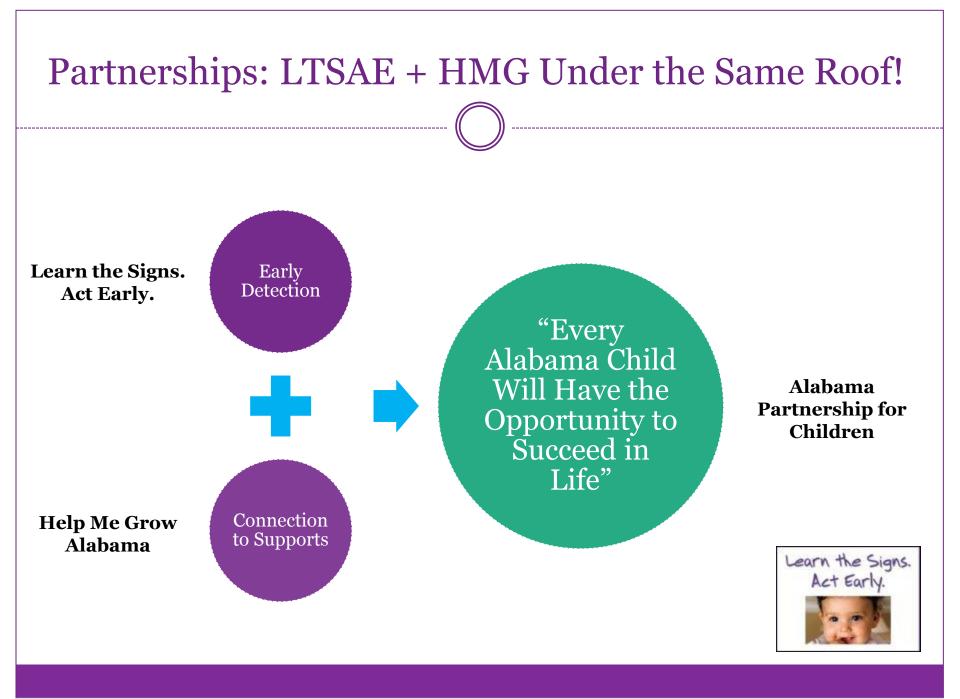

## Building the Network: Home Visitation

- Home Visitation programs are important components of the Help Me Grow resource inventory and a leading referral for enrolled families
- Home Visitation programs can use HMG as the central point of access for their services
- Home visitors can obtain resources and information for families by calling HMG
- Home Visitors can refer families directly to HMG before, during, or upon exiting program
- Home Visitors can be supported by HMG statewide leadership meetings and future community networking meetings

# Building the Network: First Class Pre-K

- Support programs and classrooms with implementing developmental screening for the children in their care and tracking their efforts
- Support teachers in identifying developmental concerns and identifying the available resources in their community

#### • Provide answers to questions:

- Who should I contact when a child in my classroom is not showing typical development?
- How can I empower my families to get connected to resources for their children?
- Who can I call to get families linked to appropriate services?

# Building the Network: IDEA

- When concerns are identified from the developmental screening, Part C (Early Intervention) and Part B (Special Education) services are often the first referral tried
- EI State Systemic Improvement Plan
  - Children at-risk for developmental delays determined ineligible for services
  - Children receiving services "age-out" or "progress-out" of eligibility
  - Children transitioning from Part C to Part B services

#### • Part B

- Different eligibility requirements
- Families choosing to "opt-out"



- Staff turnover
- Geography
- Messaging/overcoming misconceptions
- Understanding all who are providing "care coordination" and to whom – defining what each sector considers care coordination

## Lessons Learned

#### • Build on existing partnerships

- O Blueprint Committee →AABCD Stakeholder group →Help Me Grow Alabama Leadership Team →Young Child Wellness Council
- Maintain record of decision making, milestones, successes, and challenges
- Build from your state's strengths (existing systems, strong partnerships)
- Don't make assumptions! (knowledge of HMG, knowledge between systems, services offered, etc.)
- Key stakeholder buy-in every point along the way
- Clarity from the beginning
- Be willing to change and update as circumstances change
- Don't be afraid to ask for help! (materials adaptation, input from other states)
- Fidelity to the model--and always be ready for that call (statewide plan)
