This month, Dr. Dworkin explores the crucial interdependence of developmental surveillance and screening in enhancing the capacity of the medical home to support families in raising healthy children. "[S]urveillance without screening is likely to contribute to children eluding early detection," he writes, "while the isolated use of screening tools is challenged by lofty expectations despite understandably modest psychometric properties and may result in over- or under-identification."
