Update: Office of Community Child Health

The Child Health and Development Institute of CT has released a new <u>Issue Brief</u> on its partnership with Connecticut Children's Medical Center (CT Children's) to promote the new <u>Office</u> for Community Child Health (OCCH). OCCH cultivates a health system that works hard to keep children healthy and out of the hospital by connecting them to a full range of community services. The OCCH is led by Paul Dworkin, MD, Executive Vice President for Community Child Health at CT Children's, and Lisa Honigfeld, Ph.D., Vice President for Health Initiatives at CHDI, and brings together all 12 of CT Children's community-oriented health programs under one umbrella with the goals of integration, innovation, dissemination and systems change. Three HHS Agencies Issue Letter on Complex Trauma among Kids

In July, three agencies of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) – Administration for Children and Families (ACF), Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) – issued a <u>letter to state directors of child welfare, Medicaid, and mental health authorities</u> encouraging them to strengthen their efforts to address complex trauma among children and youth known to child welfare. The letter provides useful and actionable information about **federal authority and funding streams**, strategies for **coordinating cross-system efforts**, and good practices for integrating evidence-based **screening, assessment, and interventions** related to complex trauma.

Evaluation Toolkit from Maternal & Child Health Library

The <u>MCH Library Evaluation Toolkit</u> is designed to help professionals easily find high-quality information and resources on documenting and achieving measurable health outcomes. It consists of an <u>Evaluation Primer</u> that explains the basics of public health evaluations; a list of <u>Key</u> <u>Resources</u> for use in the development of evaluations; and a <u>Choose and Use Guide</u> for quickly finding current evaluations and guides for use as promising practices.

The Early Learning Challenge Grant Helping Infants and Toddlers

Fourteen states have received Early Learning Challenge (ELC) grants since the program was initiated in 2011. Though they are not using a significant portion of their grants to fund initiatives targeting infants and toddlers specifically, grantees' efforts to strengthen the systems that support all young children and families will reap many benefits for babies. <u>Read the full article to learn</u> <u>more</u> about the plans states have and progress they've made implementing ELC.

Final ABCD Paper on Influence of ABCD Initiative

The <u>latest and final paper from ABCD</u>, titled *The Enduring Influence of the Assuring Better Child Health and Development (ABCD) Initiative*, is now available. The report also provides an overview of the focus and priorities of the ABCD initiative, a high-level snapshot of impact and critical success factors that can contribute to making a difference in the health and development of young children.
