CDC: Most Children Miss Out On Developmental Screening

The Centers for Disease Control recently released new a new report highlighting that the vast majority of American children may not be receiving recommended developmental screenings. Analysis of 2007 data found that only 21.1 % of parents (of children 10-47 months) reported being asked to complete a developmental screening in the last year. Low rates of screening are a main reason why nearly 30% of children with developmental concerns entering Kindergarten have not yet been identified. [Read the report.](#)
