Cat Tamminga, MA, LSLC Cert. AVEEd.

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Cat Tamminga, MA, LSLC Cert. AVEEd., is the Part C (0-3) Coordinator for the state of Minnesota. She has been immersed in the world of infants, toddlers, and their families since she was 11 when she started her own neighborhood babysitting company via hand-written business cards. She graduated from Fontbonne University in St. Louis with a BA in Deaf Education (dual minor in Elementary Education and Speech-Language Pathology) in 2001 and an MA in Early Intervention in Deaf Education in 2002. Cat served children and families statewide in Indiana through St. Joseph Institute for the Deaf (SJID) and was the Lead Early Intervention Specialist for the St. Joseph Institute Indiana Service Corporation (SJIISC), where she helped develop and maintain the statewide Center for Deaf and Hard of Hearing Education (CDHHE) in partnership with the Indiana School for the Deaf and the state of Indiana's First Words (0-3) program. CDHHE became state law in 2012 through Indiana Code IC 20-35-11. On top of her duties as a Part C Coordinator for systems development and implementation, Cat is a Listening & Spoken Language mentor and a member of various professional organizations. She works tirelessly for equitable services for young children and their families, and supports professionals across Minnesota in their work to change the story. Shawn Holmes, BA, CAPS

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Shawn Holmes works for the MN Department of Health (MDH) as the Early Identification and Intervention Coordinator in the Children and Youth with Special Health Needs Section. She manages a statewide developmental and social-emotional screening program provided through local public health departments for children birth to 36 months who are at risk of health or developmental issues. Shawn conducts statewide training opportunities for early childhood screening providers on the use of the ASQ-3 and ASQ:SE screening instruments, typical development resources, communicating screening results, referral procedures, and connection to local evaluation and early intervention services. She has led numerous electronic screening projects from over the past eight years and provided recommendations to interagency partners on a statewide electronic screening system and screening results portal implementation.

Lucy Littlewolf Arias, M.Ed. Parent and Family Education

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Lucy Littlewolf Arias the PDG Tribal Nations Lead for the state of Minnesota. She earned a BS in Child Psychology and a M.Ed. in Parent and Family Education from the University of Minnesota. Her career in early childhood includes research addressing lead exposure during the first five years of a child's life and quality early learning environments. Ms. Arias helped develop the SEEDS of Early Literacy curriculum widely used in MN and the nation. She has been a preschool teacher and director, and has coordinated public health initiatives while working for Little Earth of United Tribes, a subsidized housing complex in South Minneapolis, for primarily Native American families. There she coordinated several projects working with families and children, including a half-day preschool program, Women's Wellness Group, and public health initiatives addressing nutrition, physical activity and smoke-free policies. Ms. Arias was a board member of Wicoie Nandagikendan an Ojibwe/Dakota Immersion preschool and currently sits on the Montessori American Indian Childcare and Minneapolis Nature Preschool's board of directors. She firmly believes in helping families and communities create healthy environments for children to thrive in. In her role as PDG Tribal Nations Lead she will continue this work by working with urban and rural American Indian communities to implement the Preschool Development Grant which includes the Help Me Connect. She is also CDC's "Learn the Signs. Act Early." Ambassador and the Division for Early Childhood Recommended Practices (aRPy) Ambassador for New Jersey. She works for the SPAN Parent Advocacy Network, a one-stop for families to receive information, support, and training, where she is also the Southern Regional Coordinator of the Family to Family Health Information Center.

Deepa is passionate about early identification and early connection to services for families with young children because she firmly believes that healthy child development leads to lifelong health and wellness. She is committed to helping families, including the most underserved, to navigate systems of care because of her own experiences as an immigrant mother, supporting parent leadership development activities, and enhancing family-professional partnerships.

Deepa is NJ's Association for Maternal and Child Health Programs (AMCHP) Family Delegate and the recipient of the 2020 Merle McPherson Award for her exemplary contributions to further family/professional collaboration within state Title V programs and AMCHP. She is also a Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental and Related Disabilities (LEND) Family Fellow. As the co-chair of the "Early Screening & Diagnosis" workgroup of Community of Care Consortium and a member of the Infant-Child Health Committee of the Council for Young Children in NJ, she has helped create several NJ-

specific resources to address gaps in connecting to services when developmental concerns are identified in young children.

Using Infant Mental Practice to Deepen Understanding

How to Spark Child Health Provider Outreach

Jill Sells, MD, FAAP

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Dr. Jill Sells is a health, early childhood, and systems consultant with experience as a primary care pediatrician and executive leader. She focuses on early childhood's systems and pediatric practice transformation efforts that increase equity and optimize the health and well-being of young children and their families. Dr. Sells facilitates health-early childhood systems connections at the national, state, and local levels. She has supported the development of state cross-sector early childhood systems, early learning, and birth to 3 plans. At the local level, she has partnered with communities and public-private initiatives to support alignment of state and local early learning and school readiness efforts, and to integrate doctors and health systems into early childhood initiatives. As a non-profit executive, she created statewide systems to engage doctors in early childhood policy advocacy through Docs For Tots, and to integrate parenting support and early literacy promotion into 220 diverse primary care clinics through Reach Out and Read. She is currently providing technical assistance to national early childhood initiatives, including Help Me Grow, and to equity-driven pediatric practice transformation efforts to support young children and their families in Mississippi and California. Dr. Sells is a Clinical Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Washington Schools of Medicine and serves as Chair of the American Academy of Pediatrics' Council on Early Childhood.
